PREPARING FOR CAMP:

BE PREPARED

The motto of the Boy Scouts of America; “Be Prepared”, will benefit every member of your troop planning on attending Camp Tiak in 2011. Be Prepared for all the changes at Camp Tiak. There have been several changes and additions to the camp fees that will benefit those troops and scoutmasters who met or exceeded the stated deadlines. A recommendation from Scoutmasters last year was that there was no incentive for troops and Scoutmasters who have made their campsite reservations, troop reservations, and pay on time. So this year a new payment schedule has been developed and there will be no deviations from this schedule. By meeting the stated schedule, this will help out staff Be Prepared 2011 Summer Camp Season.

GETTING STARTED

Troops need to submit a “Campsite Reservation Form” along with a \$25.00, (non-refundable) campsite reservation fee. Troops attending Camp Tiak in 2010 and who expressed a desire to return to Camp Tiak in 2011 were given the opportunity to pre register at the end of camp last year. Those units not having a campsite reservation form on file need to submit this form as soon as possible. Campsite reservations are on a first come, first serve basis and you could lose your campsite in the event a reservation form is not on file. If your troop does not have a campsite reservation form on file, please use Form 1 to complete the campsite reservation and secure your troops campsite for Camp Tiak 2011.

EARLY BIRD REQUIREMENTS

Troops wanting to take advantage of the Early Bird payment options of the camp fee schedule need to follow this simple time schedule.

No Later Than:

Friday, February 4, 2011 have your Troop's campsite reservation form and \$25.00 deposit fee into the Council Service Center.

Friday, March 4, 2011 first payment of \$50.00 per person is due in the Council Service Center.

Friday, April 1, 2011 second payment of \$50.00 per person is due in the Council Service Center.

Friday, May 6, 2011 have the remaining amount of \$75.00 (Pine Burr Area Council Scouts) and \$100.00 (Out of Council Scouts) per person in the Council Service Center.

Troops that do not pay their camp fee by Friday, May 6, 2011 in full will lose their "Early Bird" status and will have to pay the regular camp fees. New troops that are organized after February 1, 2011 will have an adjusted payment schedule for their troop. Webelos Scouts who cross over into a troop attending Camp Tiak in 2011 will be allowed to use the "Early Bird" payment schedule regardless of when they join the troop.

SPECIAL NOTICE

All fees are *NON-REFUNDABLE*, but can be transferred to additional scouts attending Camp Tiak.

Please use Form 2 when making payment.

SCOUTS NEEDING FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

We, the Camping Committee of the Pine Burr Area Council, are aware that in today's society there are situations where a scout might not have the resources to participate in camp because of a financial hardship in his family. The Camping Committee will accept requests for campership and then review these request on a case by case basis. To request a campership on a specific scout in your troop please use Form 3. **Scoutmasters must submit the campership application no later than Friday, March 4, 2011.** The Camping Committee will review all requests for camperships and notify the Scoutmaster of the Committees decision no later than Friday March 18, 2011. Camperships can be awarded for any percentage up to 50% of the camp fee. If your troop is awarded a campership we will automatically adjust your troop's payment schedule.

SAFETY AND REGISTRATION:

HEALTH AND SAFETY

All Scouts and leaders attending camp must have a physical examination before arriving at camp. Mississippi State law requires Health and Physical Record be updated annually for those scouts and leaders under the age of 40. This form is available through the Council Office or at the Council and/or national Council websites. Please insure that you have the current physical form. Contact your District Executive or our Council Service Center if you have questions. Upon arrival at camp, each camper will have a medical recheck and each scout and leader will have a physical form on file with the health officer during his/her stay at camp. Physical forms will be returned to the Scoutmaster when the troop completes its check out. Physical forms not collected by the scoutmaster during check out will be destroyed after 72 hours. Physical forms can only be given to the troop Scoutmasters because of the confidential information they contain.

TROOP INSURANCE

Troops are required to present a copy of their troop accident and health insurance forms upon check in, **NO EXCEPTIONS!** Troops not being able to present a copy of their accident and health insurance forms will not be allowed to check in, set up their troop site or participate in any camp programs, and cannot stay at camp until the insurance form is presented.

EMERGENCIES AT CAMP TIAK

Camp Tiak will have a qualified health individual on the camp property 24 hours a day during the camping season. The health lodge in accordance with state and local guidelines will store and administer all prescription medications as directed by the scouts personal physician and parents. In the unlikely event of serious illness or injury to a scout or adult leader, he/she will be taken to the closest hospital for treatment. The Pine Burr Area Council and/or Camp Tiak will not pay for prescription medication or emergency room costs in the event of a hospital visit by a scout or leader.

REGISTRATION AND CHECK IN

Registration and check in will start at 1:30 pm on Sunday afternoons. No Troop will be admitted to Camp Tiak before 1:30 pm. At check in each troop will need to be able to produce all the information already listed in this Camp Leaders Guide along with a complete roster of the members of your troop with emergency contact names and phone numbers. It will be the responsibility of each troop to conduct its own "pre-swim check" if they elect to do so. Troops who have conducted their own swim check must bring the attached swim check form to check in and turn it in to the Camp Director, **DO NOT MAIL THIS FORM TO THE COUNCIL SERVICE CENTER.** At check in we will update schedules, settle any remaining balances and complete any remaining paperwork.

FIRE SAFETY

Camp Tiak has a fire emergency notification system. This system will be explained at the first leaders meeting, and a test of the system will be conducted early in the week. Under no circumstances shall flames of any kind be used in any tent. If a Scout or leader plans to use their own tent for lodging, they must have the tent labeled "No flames in Tents". This can be stenciled on the tent or placed on a card in front of the tent. Flashlights and battery-powered lanterns, which do not pose an asphyxiation threat, are permissible. In the event of a fire in a campsite, scouts and/or leaders do not fight fires under any circumstances.

CORRESPONDENCE

All summer camp correspondence and registration materials should be sent to the Council Service Center until May 28, 2011. After that date, the summer camp operation will be moved to the camp facility so all correspondence should be sent directly to camp. In order to assure that your paperwork arrives at the proper location, please follow these steps. The address for both locations are:

TRANSPORTATION AND PARKING

Each Troop is responsible for the safe transportation of its members to and from camp Tiak. Make sure that all vehicles meet national insurance requirements. Transporting Scouts or adults in the bed of a pickup truck or trailer – whether it is covered or uncovered – is against the Policies of the Boy Scouts of America. Troops visiting Camp Tiak are responsible for obtaining the appropriate Local or National tour permits.

Parking is provided at the entrance of camp for leaders and visitors. The main parking area is next to the Administration Building. Vehicles are not to be parked in the campsites at any time during camp. Units are encouraged to leave a trailer in the campsite in order to store both troop and personal gear. To keep traffic in camp to a minimum, only camp vehicles will be allowed in camp during the week. Troop vehicles will be permitted into camp during check-in and check out for the purpose of unloading and loading troop and personal camping equipment. While driving in camp, please be aware of the speed limit of 7 miles per hour.

DANGEROUS WILDLIFE

Camp Tiak is a wilderness setting. While visiting the out-of-doors, remember that we are guests here and that there are several different kinds of wildlife that call Camp Tiak home. Venomous and non-venomous snakes, spiders, ticks, deer, and the national bird of Camp Tiak, mosquitoes, are just a few of the different kind of wildlife you will see at Camp Tiak. Bites from any of these animals can be painful and in some cases very serious, leaders should brief scouts on the importance of the use of insect repellents and check scouts for bites at least daily.

CAMPFIRES

Campfires are the place where your scout spirit can come alive. We will open camp with a Campfire on Sunday evening at the campfire area. This will be an opportunity for scouts to meet the Camp Staff and enjoy songs and skits performed by the staff for the camper's enjoyment. On Friday, we will have an opportunity for scouts to showcase their showmanship skill by performing their own skits and songs and show everyone what they learned through the week.

GENERAL INFORMATION:

CHECK IN PROCEDURES

This section will help you, the Scoutmaster, when arriving at Camp Tiak. **Check in will start at 1:30 pm and end at 3:00 pm**, scoutmasters should be ready to complete the check in procedures upon arrival. Check in will be completed at the administration building which is located next to the main parking lot. Upon arrival each troop will be met with a Camp Tiak Troop Guide who will take the scouts on a tour of Camp Tiak. Troop leaders should have a final count of the members attending camp, merit badge schedules, medical forms, and a written explanation of any scout who needs or requires any special medical needs. Troops who have completed their own pre-swim test should be prepared to present the pre-swim test form upon check in. If a pre-swim test has not been conducted, scouts will have to opportunity to complete their swim check at the end of their camp tour. Medical re-checks will be conducted by trained medical personnel prior to any scout being allowed to participate in any camp program.

CAMPSITE INSPECTION – CHECK-IN/OUT

Troop leaders will be accompanied with a Camp Tiak Staff member and complete a campsite inspection of all equipment in each campsite. Problems with any piece of equipment, specifically tents, cots, leaders hut, etc will be noted. Upon check out the same inspection will be conducted again and any new problems identified will be the responsibility of the troop to correct. Rips, tears, or holes in tents, and/or cots will be charged to the troop. Tents and/or cots deemed to be un-repairable will be charged a prorated fee to the troop to replace the item.

RAIN PLANS

As long as your youth have a dry change of clothing, your activities need not be confined indoors in bad weather. Some program areas are closed for safety reasons. Check with the appropriate department to be sure.

Ideas for a rainy day: woodcarving, soap carving, “bone-up” on advancement, games with paper and pencil, wet weather fire building, etc.

The camp program goes on, rain or shine!

EVENING PROGRAM

The evening activity periods are from 7:00 pm to 8:30 pm. This is a good time for informal unit activities and sports programs. You may wish to challenge another unit to a ball game. The trading post is open for snacks. Boating, archery and rifle are open for individual participation. Most evenings a camp program is scheduled, but Monday and Thursday are the unit’s nights to do something special.

BUDDY SYSTEM

For safety the buddy system is used at all times throughout camp. This is very important and will be watched closely by staff. Leaders are asked to be sure each Scout understands the operation of the Buddy System and plan accordingly.

ARRIVAL

Check-in time begins at 1:30 pm. We ask that all units arrive in camp no later than **3:00 pm** in order to complete the check-in process. Please keep in mind that no camp services (including first aid, etc.) will be available until 1:30 pm. Troops arriving early must be self-sufficient and cannot begin transporting gear to their site. Remember that no private vehicles except vehicles pulling unit trailers or equipment vehicles are allowed on camp roads. If you are going to arrive at camp after 3:00 pm, please call the camp office and let us know!

TRAILERS

In-bound: 1:30 – 3:00 Outbound: After 3:00pm

Upon arrival at Camp, troops with an equipment trailer will be allowed to tow them into their campsite. No vehicles are to remain in the campsite. It is recommended that all other gear is to be “packed in” by the youth in the unit.

PARKING

Parking is available in **Big Parking Lot**. Again, no private vehicles are allowed on camp roads.

HOW TO CHECK-IN

Beginning at 1:30 pm, your staff guide will meet you at the Admin Building, to lead your unit through our check-in process.

Please have the following items ready:

- A complete and accurate Merit Badge Schedule for your Troop.
- A complete and accurate attendance list (your roster will be used for your financial check-in).
- Prescription medication, 1 copy of each medical form (keep the originals at home) and any needed medication cards (if not already mailed in).

COMMISSIONER SERVICE

After your troop guide has completed his/her assignment, he will be available throughout the week to assist your troop and will eat all meals with the troop. Last year the camp had a very successful Commissioner Staff who helped out the troop leaders with all their questions and concerns. This year we once again have a qualified Commissioner, who will be visiting campsites and offering suggestions to make your camping experience an enjoyable one. Your troop Commissioner will be visiting your campsite within the first few hours of your arrival to give you up-dates and to answer any questions you might have.

FLAG CEREMONIES

The camp will assemble for flag ceremonies in the morning and evenings. Scouts and leaders are expected to attend evening flag ceremonies in full Class A uniforms. Troops are encouraged to assist with flag ceremonies and blessing of the meals.

VESPERS & CHAPLAIN

Vespers is a short fellowship service held on Wednesday evening. Vesper Service will be held at the Pine Eagle Chapel and everyone is encouraged to attend. Members of the camp staff or scouts attending Camp Tiak will conduct vespers, with assistance of the visiting clergy.

LEADER'S MEETING

In an effort to keep everyone informed and up-to-date with the on-going changes that occur during Summer Camp, we will hold a Leaders meeting every morning after breakfast in the dining hall. Senior Patrol Leaders will meet everyday at 1:00 pm at the Frazier Pavilion.

LEADERSHIP IN CAMP

All units are required to have two adult leaders in camp at all times. This is a National Council standard/requirement. All leaders must be registered members of the Boy Scouts and meet the membership qualifications of the BSA. The Troop Scoutmaster must be at least 21 years of age, Assistant Scoutmasters must be at least 18 years of age or older. Leader fees are \$40.00 per person with exception of the first two leaders who are allowed to come to Camp Tiak for free.

Troops that cannot meet the requirement of two-deep leadership will be placed into campsites with another troop to meet this requirement. In the event you are unable to have two adult leaders in camp, Scoutmasters should contact the Camp Director so that arrangements can be made to camp your troop with another troop with the same challenge.

TRADING POST

Camp Tiak operates a modern and efficient Trading Post. Our Trading Post stocks many items that are related to Scout merit badges. In addition to crafts, the Trading Post also stocks concession items. Some of the items stocked are camp caps, writing paper, craft items, pocket knives, postcards, hot pocket, cold drinks, ice cream, snow cones, candy, folding chairs, batteries, Camp Tiak T-Shirts and camp patches.

Most scouts will spend on the average of \$35 - \$50 in the trading post. This will generally pay for merit badge materials and a few snacks throughout the week. Please budget accordingly. Camp Tiak has no ATM, so please be sure your scouts bring enough cash and/or debit/credit card.

GENERAL INFORMATION:

VISITORS

Visitors will have the opportunity to eat dinner with their sons in the dining hall. Cost for the evening meal is \$5.00 for adults and \$3.50 for children under the age of 12. Dinner tickets can be purchased at the Trading Post. Parents should plan on arriving at 3:30 pm.

Scoutmasters will need to provide to the Camp Director no later than the morning meeting a head count of additional people who will be at the dinner meal so that enough food can be prepared.

PHONE

There is no phone service in camp. Please call your Scout Leaders cell phone or you can leave a message on the Camp Rangers phone at 601-928-4878.

FACILITIES FOR THE PHYSICALLY CHALLENGED

Sioux campsite is a barrier free site at Camp Tiak. It will accommodate up to 40 physically challenged scouts and adult leaders. It is conveniently located near the dining facility. Troops with special-need scouts are given priority in reserving this site.

CAMPSITES

Camp Tiak has thirteen troop campsites which are outfitted with two man wall tents on platforms. Each tent will accommodate two cots. Each troop site has a latrine and facilities for hand washing and showers.

FOOD SERVICE

All meals will be served in the air condition dining facility. Meals are provided in a modified cafeteria style fashion. A well-balanced menu has been designed to please both scouts and adult leaders. Troops eat together. Each troop will provide a table waiter for each table assigned to them. Table waiters will set up each table for each meal and then clean up those tables after each meal. Troops will have the opportunity to prepare meals in their campsites if they wish.

CHECK-OUT

On Saturday morning each troop will be required to check-out prior to leaving Camp Tiak. These steps will assist you in making sure everything has been completed prior to departing camp. Each troops "Camp Tiak Troop Guide" will assist the unit in completing the check-out procedures. Those procedures are:

Campsite. A complete inspection of the campsite will be conducted to insure that the camp equipment is returned in as good condition as when the troop arrived.

Trash. All trash will be bagged using the trash bags provided and placed in the dumpsters behind the Dining Hall.

Quartermaster Supplies. All supplies checked out through the quartermaster will be returned to the quartermaster.

Administration Building. The Scoutmaster and Senior Patrol Leader must come to the administration building to collect medical forms, Camp Tiak Summer Camp Special Patches, and turn in camp evaluation forms.

Departing Camp Tiak. Troops should be packed and ready to depart Camp Tiak by 10:30 am on Saturday morning.

MAIL

All outgoing mail may be placed in the mailbox inside the Trading Post. Mail will be delivered and pick-up on a daily basis. Incoming mail will be available only to unit leaders after 1:30 pm. All mail sent to Camp Tiak should be addressed as below.

Parents are encouraged to write their sons while they are at camp. Please remember the mail takes time, letters mailed after Wednesday probably will not arrive in time to be delivered to the scouts. All mail received after a troop has checked out of camp will be returned to the sender.

WHAT TO BRING TO CAMP:

TIPS

Other than some basic items, different people and troops will bring different items with them. A good exercise is to think about your perfect week at camp and bring items that you see in your mental picture. If you want to spend the week fishing don't forget to bring your fishing rod and tackle box. To help you keep from forgetting those important items, we have a list to help you with your packing.

WHAT NOT TO BRING TO CAMP

Personal Firearms or other firearms, ammunition, and bows are not allowed in camp. Only those supplied by the Shooting Sports area are to be used. Sheath knives of any kind are not allowed at any time in any camp operated by the Boy Scouts of America. In addition, no pets or fireworks of any kind are allowed at Camp Tiak. Camp Tiak and/or the Pine Burr Area Council will not be responsible for the loss of these items.

MERIT BADGE PROGRAM:

Camp Tiak offers a wide selection of merit badges. We are constantly evaluating our merit badge program to bring new and exciting opportunities that scouts may not be able to complete elsewhere. Most merit badges can be completed at camp; however, because of time requirements, special projects, or other considerations, some merit badges require prerequisites or special skill levels. Merit Badges are listed alphabetically with a short description of each badge including any requirements that may or must be completed at home, and the prerequisites (if any) for the badge. There are also a few helpful tips on what to bring. Some merit badges are limited in size to ensure safety and quality instruction. These size limitations are indicated in the merit badge description.

AQUATICS

Scouts who wish to participate in the Aquatics Area must pass the BSA Swimmers Test before being able to sign up for Aquatics merit badges.

BSA Lifeguard: This is a rigorous program that certifies a Scout to be Lifeguard. Scouts are required to spend all of their time in the Aquatics area. Physical strength, stamina, and a great deal of written work are required. Bring long pants, a long sleeve buttoned down shirt and shoes that can get wet. **This program is recommended only for older Scouts and strong swimmers.** It is recommended that CPR instruction be completed prior to camp. Adults are welcome to participate in the BSA Lifeguard program.

Canoeing: Good physical strength and stamina are required. This is a good merit badge to introduce boating; it is more fun and less difficult than rowing. It is recommended that the CPR instruction (requirement 2) be completed before camp.

Kayaking: This is not a merit badge, but provides an introduction to skills and safety procedures and serves as a program opportunity in camp or out. Mastery of Kayaking BSA skills is a first critical step towards satisfying Safety Afloat guidelines for safe kayak excursions.

Lifesaving: This is an Eagle required merit badge. It is a challenging merit badge that requires physical strength and stamina. Bring long pants, long-sleeve button down shirt, and shoes that can get wet. It is recommended that CPR instruction (requirement 13) be completed prior to camp.

Mile Swim: This is not a merit badge, but allows scouts and leaders to earn the Mile Swim award. Scouts are required to swim an increased amount each day and build up to a mile. The Mile Swim generally takes place on Friday morning.

Rowing: Physical strength and stamina required. The skills are more difficult to master than in Canoeing. It is highly recommended that CPR instruction (requirement 2) be completed prior to camp.

Small Boat Sailing: Again this is a good merit badge for older scouts who are qualified swimmers.

Swimming: This is an Eagle required merit badge. It is a good entry-level Aquatics merit badge. Bring long pants, a long sleeve button down shirt and shoes that can get wet.

Swimming Instruction: This session is for all scouts who did not pass the BSA Swimmers Test. This instructional time will improve a scout’s ability to swim and the goal of passing the BSA Swimmers Test by weeks end. Scouts can request to take the swimmers test at any time they feel they can pass the test.

The aquatics area will teach youth how to safely enjoy all waterfront activities, including swimming, boating, canoeing, and sailing. The waterfront experience begins with the swim check on Sunday afternoon, when each participant will be placed in one of the following ability groups:

Non-swimmer: Brief entry into shallow water to assess comfort level, or swim less than 50 yards.

Beginner: Must enter water feet first, and then swim 50 yards in water that is over swimmer’s head.

Swimmer: Must enter water feet first, then swim 100 yards as follows: 75 yards in strong manner using side, breast, trudgeon or front crawl strokes; 25 yards using elementary backstroke; rest, by floating or with just enough motion to stay afloat.

*The **Buddy System** is used at all times during all aquatics activities and in all other areas of camp. Leaders are asked to be sure that each youth understands the operation of the buddy system and that it is enforced within their unit.

***All Aquatic merit badges require each youth to show proficiency in CPR before arriving at camp. Need a verification note from leader or guardian.

OUTDOOR SKILLS

The Outdoor Skills area is where core Scouting skills are developed. It serves as camp's headquarters for Camping, Emergency Preparedness, First Aid, Pioneering, Orienteering and Wilderness Survival. This area is also home to many advancement and special activity opportunities for all ages.

Camping: This is an Eagle required merit badge. It requires an overnight camping trip. Scouts should bring appropriate camping equipment (backpack, sleeping bag, etc) in addition, Scouts must bring a personal or unit tent from home suitable for backpacking, and know how to set it up. Requirements 1, 2, 3, 4, 6a, 6b, and 7c may be completed before coming to camp. Requirements 8d and 9 must be completed before coming to camp.

Cooking: Introduces principles of cooking that can be used at home or in the outdoors. Scouts will learn about food safety, nutritional guidelines, meal planning, and methods of food preparation, and will review the variety of culinary (or cooking) careers available,.

Emergency Preparedness: This is an Eagle required merit badge. It covers a great deal of written information, and deals with skills that must be mastered. This badge is recommended for older scouts. Requirements 1 & 8 must be completed before taking this merit badge.

First Aid: This is an Eagle required merit badge. It covers a great deal of written materials and there are skills to master. Familiarity with knots is extremely important. This badge is recommended for older scouts. It is recommended that CPR instruction be completed prior to camp.

Geocaching: This is a new merit badge which will help you understand the proper use of a GPS (Global Positioning System) unit and geocaches. This is a game played around the world.

Pioneering: This merit badge requires scouts to complete pioneering projects. A familiarity with knots, lashing, and splices is important. Requirement 7 should be completed prior to coming to camp if at all possible.

Wilderness Survival: This merit badge requires an overnight camping trip which you will make a wilderness shelter and sleep in it. Requirement 5 may be completed before coming to camp.

CONSERVATION / NATURAL SCIENCES

The Conservation/Natural Sciences department provides learning about the wonders of our surrounding environment for all ages, Scout and leaders alike. Come and discover the fundamentals of conservation, which play such a large part in the Scouting program.

Archeology: Archaeologists are detectives who study how people lived in the past. They figure out what happened, when, how, and why. Using the clues that people left behind, they try to understand how and why human culture has changed through time.

Astronomy: This badge is offered in the evening with some daylight work. Scouts will observe the beautiful night sky over Camp Tiak with the aid of a telescope. This merit badge is not recommended for first year campers.

Bird Study: Birds are among the most fascinating creatures on Earth. Many are beautifully colored, others are accomplished singers.

Environmental Science: This is an Eagle required merit badge. It requires daily hikes, field notes, and experiments. There is a great deal of written material, but some requirements (requirements 1, 6, and 7) can be completed before coming to camp.

Fishing: This is an excellent merit badge for first year scouts. It requires some written work and some early morning fishing trips.

Forestry: If you are interested in trees this merit badge is for you.

Geology: The study of Earth. It includes the study of materials that make up Earth, the processes that change it, and the history of how things happened, including human civilization, which depends on natural materials for existence.

Insect Study: This merit badge will require hiking and observation.

Nature: This is an excellent introductory merit badge to the Nature area. It requires hiking and observations.

Reptile and Amphibian Study: This badge requires drawings and night observations. Requirement 2 may be completed before coming to camp. Scouts must keep a reptile or amphibian for at least one month to complete the merit badge. This requirement (requirement 8) must be completed outside of camp. This merit badge is not recommended for scouts who are very afraid of snakes, although the instruction may lessen these fears.

HORSEMANSHIP

Horsemanship: This is an excellent merit badge for scouts who like animals and enjoy riding or who want to learn. This is a two hour class offered once in the morning and once in the afternoon.

SHOOTING SPORTS

Shooting Sports is made up of the archery, rifle and shotgun ranges. All are supervised by trained and nationally certified adult personnel. Youth learn the fundamentals of safe shooting and handling of firearms plus experience the pride of learning a new skill. Shooting sports is an excellent opportunity for youth that may not have other opportunities to enjoy marksmanship.

The shooting spots department offers the archery, rifle and shotgun merit badges. These merit badges require skill, patience, and a degree of physical maturity.

Which Shooting Sports Merit Badges Should I Take?

- Shooting Sports merit badges are not recommended for first year Scouts.
- It is recommended to only take one shooting merit badge per week because they have different fundamentals and often require extra time to complete the shooting requirements.
- Hunter’s Safety is helpful for Rifle and Shotgun, but not required.
- Shotgun participants should be 14 years of age due to size requirements, instructor makes final call. We recommend completing Rifle merit badge before enrolling in Shotgun merit badge.
- An open block in the afternoon is helpful to complete archery and rifle.

Archery: This merit badge requires a lot of time to master the art of archery. Scouts will learn the parts of a bow and arrow and will be required to fletch arrows and make a bow string.

Muzzleloading: Will depend on a qualified instructor.

Rifle Shooting: Shooting experience is highly recommended but not a requirement. Scouts should be at least 13 years of age or be a second year camper to participate in this merit badge.

Shotgun Shooting: This program will teach the basics of handling and shooting a shotgun as well and safety precautions. Scouts will have the chance to shoot both skeet and trap in this program. Scouts must be at least 14 years of age to take this merit badge.

Open Shoot: Scouts are encouraged to work on the shooting requirements for their merit badges during open shooting, at no cost, until their requirements are complete. Leaders and scouts who have completed the merit badge requirements can purchase ticket at the trading post. Cost will be 5 dollars for either 20 rounds on the rifle range or ten (10) shells for the shotgun range.

FIRST YEAR CAMPER PROGRAM

This program will give your first year scouts an opportunity to participate in additional advancement opportunities while at camp. Each scout in the Trailblazer Program will learn the basic skills that all Scouts must master to become proficient in camping and outdoors activities. Trailblazers will be a comprehensive outdoor program. While designed for scouts who are new to scouting, any scout attending summer camp for the first time and are not yet a First Class Scout should consider joining in on the fun and work toward completing those final requirements for the Tenderfoot, Second Class, or First Class ranks. After completing the Trailblazer session each day, Scouts will have the opportunity to earn merit badges the last two classes of each day as well as the night classes.

RUCKER W. HOWELL PROJECT C.O.P.E. **(CHALLENGING OUTDOOR PERSONAL EXPERIENCE)**

PROJECT C.O.P.E.

The goals of project C.O.P.E. are to build leadership, self-esteem, decision-making, trust, and teamwork. Progressing as a group, through a series of increasingly physical and mentally challenging elements that require cooperation and teamwork to complete the experience is the goal of all scouts who “Choose to COPE”.

COPE will be held in two sessions COPE 1 (low course) and COPE 2 (high course). The low course will be in the morning starting at 8:00 and the high course will begin at 1:30.

CLIMBING & RAPPELLING

Climbing and rappelling is a fast growing recreational activity. You will begin with training at the 45 foot Howell Helix Tower. You will learn the basics on the tower using artificial rock-holds. As you work your way up and down the tower’s challenging walls, your skills and endurance will increase. Participants will have the opportunity to earn the Climbing Merit Badge, one of the exciting merit badges Camp Tiak has to offer.

Climbing will be depend on the availability of a NCS Qualified Instructor.

TWILIGHT ACTIVITIES

Many opportunities are available for troops in the evening hours prior to Taps. As in years past, there will of course be the regular volley ball games, vesper services, and open program areas for scouts to participate in making the evening full of fun and enjoyment. A complete finalized schedule will be available to leaders upon check in to Camp Tiak.

ADULT LEADER OPPORTUNITIES

Camp Tiak is a great time and location for leaders to catch up on various training. If you are interested in taking or if you are qualified to instruct any of these courses, please contact the Camp Director during check in and we will schedule them for you. Training courses at Camp Tiak, depending upon availability will be:

Climb on Safety: This is a climbing orientation course for all leaders. This course will not certify a leader to operate a climbing program but it will give those hands on training and knowledge on how to assist a certified climbing instructor.

Safe Swim Defense and Safety Afloat: This training is a must for any scoutmaster wanting to take his/her troop on a canoe trip or anything to do with the water. This training will be conducted by the Aquatics Director and cover valuable information concerning the BA policies of aquatic activities on the unit level.

Certifications

We offer a number of training and certification courses during the week at camp. These include:

- Safe Swim Defense (recommended for all leaders)
- Safety Afloat (recommended for all leaders)
- Climb on Safely
- Trek Safety (backpacking/trekking equivalent of Safety Afloat/Safe Swim Defense)
- Leave No Trace – Outdoor Ethics
- BSA Lifeguard
- Swimming and Rescue Methods
- Paddle Craft Safety

Instructional HELP: We can always use help with the instruction of the many skills taught at camp. If you have any special abilities you're willing to share, please let us know on Sunday. In the past, we've had sessions and demonstrations from leaders in emergency preparedness, aquatics, wilderness survival, bird study and others. Adults are always welcome to observe any of the merit badge or other instructional sessions.

Supervision: We can also use a hand during the instructional sessions – we may use you as a coach, a volunteer, or a helping hand to keep things running smoothly. If you have some spare time and a special interest, talk to your commissioner or the appropriate area director on Sunday. We always need assistance in the following areas:

- Aquatics (especially guards during instructional periods)
- First Year Camper Program
- Outdoor Skills
- Shooting Sports
- Conservation/Natural Sciences

Camp Facility Projects: Our Camp Ranger can always use a spare hand or two with various physical camp projects. If you have any mechanical skills (esp. carpentry, electrical and plumbing) and some spare time, speak with the Camp Director.

Meetings:

MON – FRI – Daily meetings are held with the Commissioners and the Camp Director, for adults at 8:00 am in the Dining Hall. Topics will vary from day to day, but this is generally a “working committee” on camp and it is important to have someone available from your unit to attend each day.
